


a common mission, we can accomplish so much! I've missed you all and am eager to see you on the trail!

MEET OUR 2021 SEASONAL STAFF







Have you been wondering what trail work is all about? Are you looking for a fun and rewarding way to kick off the summer hiking season? This is a great opportunity to learn about the tools and techniques used to maintain trails while spending the day outside.

Join SBFC staff and volunteers at the Bear Creek Trail #5 on the Bitterroot National Forest. We will perform annual maintenance on the first few miles of this popular I4-mile trail. There will be potential for a group of volunteers to join SBFC staff in clearing the Bear Creek Overlook Trail #126 as well.

We will have a task for everyone! You can choose to brush vegetation back to widen the trail corridor with loppers, clean any leaf litter and rocks from drains with a shovel, use a crosscut or hand saw to clear any downed trees in the trail, or redefine tread with a pick-mattock.

SBFC will provide lunch, snacks, and cold beverages.

CONNIE SAYLOR JOHNSON WILDERNESS EDUCATION FUND UPDATE

In 2019, SBFC established an endowment fund for wilderness education to honor the memory and service of Connie Saylor Johnson (1941-2018) and her career devoted to involving youth and teachers in wilderness stewardship.

Connie Saylor Johnson was a beloved friend, teacher, mentor, mother, and life-long educator. She was the first field staff member of the Selway Bitterroot Frank Church Foundation when it was established in 2006 and was instrumental in the creation of SBFC's Wilderness Ranger Fellow program. She joined the SBFC board in 2009 after retiring as a wilderness ranger and remained on the board until her passing in 2018.

The Connie Saylor Johnson Wilderness Education Fund enables the Selway Bitterroot Frank Church Foundation to provide incentive grants for educators and educational organizations to incorporate the stewardship of wilderness and natural ecosystems into classroom and/or outdoor curriculum. This fund will support wilderness education for future generations by providing teachers and educational organizations with incentive grants for wilderness education.

Connie believed in the power and necessity of Wilderness education. Her passion for getting people into Wilderness brought generations of students into the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness; as SBFC Wilderness Ranger Fellows, project and cabin volunteers, and eternal Wilderness advocates.

We are thrilled to announce that, because of your support, 2021 will be the inaugural year of grant designations through the Connie Saylor Johnson Wilderness Education Fund. Grant applications open May 1st,2021 and the first round of grants will be distributed in February of 2022.
